

### IRC Conference is an Open Forum

The IRC Conference serves as an open forum and exchange of ideas and opinions. Opinions that are expressed by program presenters and participants do not reflect endorsements by the Illinois Reading Council.

### • Conference Sessions

All conference sessions will be held in the Bank of Springfield Center, President Abraham Lincoln Hotel, and Wyndham Hotel.

### • Pre-Registration & Registration

Pre-registered conferees may obtain their registration packets at the Registration Desk in the Bank of Springfield Center Lobby. On-site registration is also available. Hotel reservations and meal function tickets should be secured prior to arrival in Springfield. Registration Hours: Wednesday, March  $9-5:00 \, \text{p.m.} - 9:00 \, \text{p.m.}$ . Thursday, March  $10-7:00 \, \text{a.m.} - 2:00 \, \text{p.m.}$ . Friday, March  $11-7:00 \, \text{a.m.} - 2:00 \, \text{p.m.}$ 

### ISBE PD Clock Hours

IRC is an approved ISBE Professional Development Provider. Registered conference attendees can earn up to one clock hour for each session attended. Registered presenters can also earn up to eight clock hours for presenting a session. At the end of the conference, plan to submit your clock hours for the sessions that you attended and/or presented at the conference via an online form. The ISBE Evidence of Participation will be sent to you about two weeks after the conference.

### Admission to Meetings

Paid conferees receive a badge with their registration packet. Badges are required at all times and for all conference functions. Seating will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Pre-purchased tickets are required for all meal functions.

### No Shuttle Service – Parking Options

There will be no shuttle service this year. Downtown Springfield has many public parking options that cost anywhere from \$5 to \$10 a day to park. 

# LINOIS READS PEED-DATING EVENT



Are you interested in learning how to nominate individuals from your area for IRC awards or how to benefit from grant money that is available each year for various educational activities? Barack Obama Library Award. This award is a classroom library, valued at over \$1000, which was created in 2006 through a generous gift to the IRC from (then) Senator Obama. This collection is comprised of carefully selected literature that is "culturally relevant" for African-American readers and targets students in the middle-school (5th-8th) grade range. The award will go to a teacher in a predetermined IRC Region. Each year, the region will be announced on the IRC Website. Nominations are due by November 1st.

**Family Literacy Award.** This award recognizes an IRC member who promotes and supports parent involvement in children's reading. Proposals should be postmarked by November 1st.

Gene Cramer ICARE for Reading Award. The Illinois Council for Affective Reading Education recognizes an educator who has performed in an outstanding manner to show concern for the affective domain and who has performed lifelong reading habits among students. The Nomination Form is due by November 1st.

Hall of Fame Award. The IRC has designed the Hall of Fame to recognize significant contributions to reading or reading education. The award will be given at the annual conference. 

Beginning with common instructional practices and beliefs, participants will explore curriculum and teaching methods that might contain mistakes as well as the ways in which we protect these mistakes from critique. Participants will then try a framework to help identify mistakes in their practice before moving on to exploring ways that student mistakes in writing can provide windows into knowledge and skill.

### **Prompting Empowerment, & Cultivating Joy!**



Visual literacy tools are access points for readers as they make meaning of texts and images. Our ability to see and to imbue meaning from those observations begins to develop before we speak, and well before we compose. Research, and our lived experiences, have shown that even our youngest learners become unwitting consumers of harmful images both in and out of schooled spaces. Our daily lives are saturated with ableist, racist, sexist, and otherwise bias images without critique. Understanding metaphors within a visual text can support deeper



comprehension and empower readers as they work across texts. This session will invite our community to explore ways visual literacies can elucidate texts and empower communities.

### May 4, 2022 ~ Joelle Charbonneau Changing the World One Word, One Book and One Reader at a Time



Join New York Times Best-Selling author Joelle Charbonneau in a discussion of the importance of the worlds used throughout history and how since books were first created, they always seem to be under attack. She will walk through the words that have shaped our past, how the limiting of the words we read and use should always be questioned and the unique place of teachers, librarians and readers to not only use words and stories to open eyes, create discussion and inspire—but to change the world.



### June 1, 2022 ~ Aeriale N. Johnson Using Text Sets to Nurture Thinkers, Speakers, Readers, Writers, and Tiny Human Beings



Reading is both an individual and collective act. Just as human beings are apt to experience joy in community, reading is a more joyful experience when educators and children bring texts into communion with one another. When we curate text sets as a ritual, children learn that being a broad and critical reader is not just something we do; it is a way of being.
