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IRC AWARDS AND GRANTS AT THE 2024 IRC CONFERENCE By the Illinois Reading Council

Barack Obama Library Award Michael Kennedy St. Catherine-St. Lucy School Oak Park, Illinois

This award is a classroom library, valued at \$1000, which was created in 2006 through a generous gift to the IRC from (then) Senator Obama. This collection comprises carefully selected literature that is "culturally relevant" for African-American readers and targets students in the middle-school (5th-8th) grade range. Nominations for the next award are due November 1st.

Jerry Johns Reading Educator of the Year Award Kevin Frederick Dr. Howard Elementary School Champaign, Illinois

This award recognizes an outstanding teacher who makes contributions in promoting literacy among students, colleagues, and school communities. Nominations for the next award are due November 1st.

Static Sticker Decal Contest Jameson Lundy Moye Elementary School O'Fallon, Illinois


Students in grade 4, 5, or 6 are encouraged to create an original design promoting reading. The winning design is printed on static stick decals and the winner is invited to the annual IRC Conference to receive their award. Entries must be postmarked no later than January 15.

IRC Service Award Kevin Daugherty Illinois Agriculture in the Classroom Bonnie Matheis Illinois State Library and Illinois Center for the Book

The IRC Service Award is awarded to the most deserving individuals for their service to the Illinois Reading Council. The award is given at the annual IRC Conference. Nominations for the next award are due November 1st.

Prairie State Award for Excellence in Children's Writing Sarah Aronson

This award recognizes an Illinois Children's or YA author whose body of work demonstrates excellence, engenders a love of literature, and embraces an important part of the mission of the Illinois Reading Council—to promote lifelong literacy. Nominations for the next award are dues June 15th.



The Illinois Reading Council is also accepting grant applications for the following programs:

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International Grant: The International Committee of the Illinois Reading Council has created a grant to promote literacy projects internationally. Studies indicate that poverty levels and literacy rates are inversely proportional. By supporting our international community in the areas of literacy, it in turn improves our universal society. The IRC wants to support these efforts. The <u>Grant Application and Guidelines</u> are available online. The maximum amount per grant is \$500. The application deadline is May 1. Grants will be awarded for the next fiscal year from July to June. Awards will be announced by July 15.

Literacy Support Grant: The Illinois Reading Council will award financial grants to local and special interest councils and individual council members for the purpose of promoting literacy development in the school and community, and/or providing professional development opportunities related to the improvement of reading and writing instruction. If fulfilling one of the above stated purposes requires a joint effort with another school, district, or other agency, letters stating their intended involvement are required from these agencies. The <u>Guidelines and</u> <u>Application Forms</u> are available online. There is no specific amount per grant. The amount awarded for each grant may be less than the amount requested. Application deadline is May 1. Grants will be awarded for the next fiscal year from July to June. Awards will be announced by July 15.



The International Literacy Association has also announced their Chapter Awards. We are excited to share that **Prairie Area Reading Council** (Year 14) has been awarded the ILA Honor Award that recognizes local, student, and special interest chapters that organize and conduct well-rounded programs serving the chapter members, the community, the state/provincial chapter, and the International Literacy Association. 
I am reading <u>Homeland: My Father Dreams of Palestine</u> by Hannah Moushabeck and illustrated by Reem Madooh.




Illinois Reads Pick of the Month is <u>World Made of Glass</u> by Ami Polonsky. ~ 2024 Illinois Reads Book List, Grades 6 to 8



A girl channels her grief and pain into love and activism in this heartbreaking, heart-mending novel of family, friendship, and community. Iris tries to act normal at school, going through the motions and joking around with her friends. But nothing is normal, and sometimes it feels like she'll never laugh again. How can she, when her dad is dying of a virus that's off-limits to talk about? When she knows that soon all she'll have left of her kind, loving dad are memories, photos, and a binder full of the poems they used to exchange? In a sea of rage and grief, Iris resolves to speak out against the rampant fear, misinformation, and prejudice surrounding AIDS—and find the pieces of Dad that she never knew before. Along the way, Iris might just find new sides to herself.

When Kitty Karr Tate, a White icon of the silver screen, dies and unexpectedly leaves her multimillion-dollar estate to the St. John sisters, three young and wealthy Black women, it starts a buzz throughout the press and Hollywood. Elise St. John, a current Hollywood star, would rather focus on Kitty's estate than deal with her own brewing scandals in the press. However, as she reads through Kitty's journals, Elise uncovers unexpected secrets from Kitty's past that will rock the lives of her family. This book is a page-turner as it tells the story of Kitty's ascent to glamorous stardom from the segregated South. It is all about family ties, race, gender, debts owed, and debatable crimes, and past choices made to break free of them.


