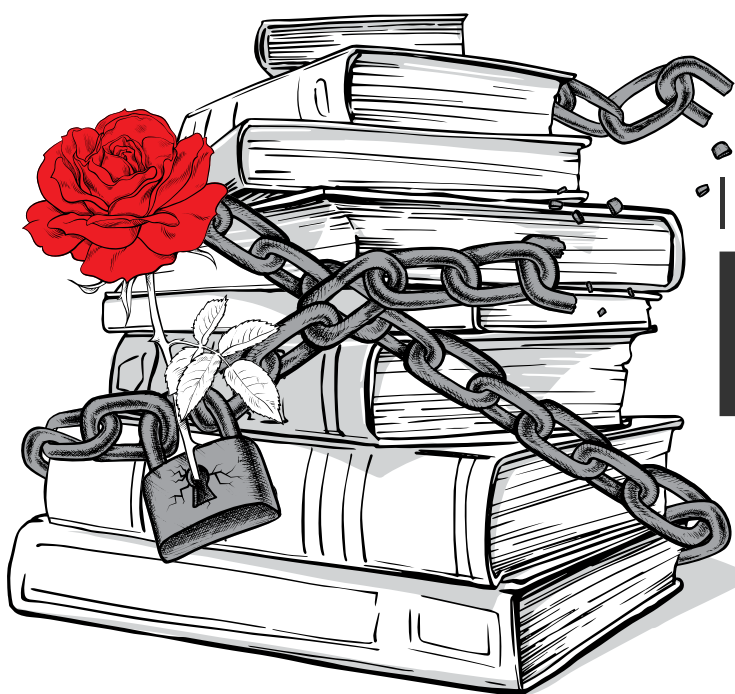

IRC believes...

- ★ literacy is a fundamental human right.
- ★ literacy is a powerful tool for justice and equity and must be protected as a right for all students.

Laurie Halse Anderson

Laurie Halse Anderson will be the first to tell you that her writing is not about “problems” but “resilience.” She writes stories with strong characters who overcome injustice and challenges. She provides a voice to the voiceless with award-winning books, such as *Chains*, *Wintergirls*, *Independent Dames*, *Catalyst*, *The Impossible Knife of Memory*. Her 1999 novel *Speak* was a National Book Award finalist, Printz Honor book, and has appeared on the list of the most banned books every year since its publication. Twenty years later, she released her *New York Times* bestselling memoir-in-verse, *Shout*, about surviving sexual assault at the age of thirteen. In recognition of her impressive body of work and tireless work against censorship, she is the 2023 winner of the prestigious Astrid Lindgren Memorial Award for outstanding contribution to children’s and young adult literature and has been recognized by the National Coalition Against Censorship and the National Council of Teachers of English. She is a member of RAINN’s National Leadership Council and frequently speaks about supporting survivors of sexual assault and bringing perpetrators to justice.



Darcie Little Badger

When Darcie Little Badger was in the first grade, she wrote a 40-page mystery involving a murdered garden and opals in an attic. Her storytelling continues today as an earth scientist with a PhD in oceanography, a writer, and a fan of the weird, beautiful, and haunting. She draws on the traditional Lipan Apache storytelling structure to weave together fantasy, nature, family, and justice. Her Locus Award-winning debut novel, *Elatsoe*, was a National Indie Bestseller named to over a dozen best-of-year lists and featured in *Time Magazine* as one of the best 100 fantasy books ever. Her second novel, *A Snake Falls to Earth*, received a Nebula Award, an Ignite Award, a Newbery Honor, and was longlisted for the National Book Award for Young People’s Literature. She has contributed to several compilations featuring Indigenous voices. Her latest book, *Sheine Lende*, deepens and expands her one-of-a-kind world and introduces us to another cast of characters that will wind their way around readers’ hearts.



Cozbi A. Cabrera

This year’s Prairie State Award winner, Cozbi A. Cabrera, finds joy in creating things that provide a place of sense and memory. After receiving a BFA from Parsons School of Design, Cozbi was an art director creating music packaging in New York. She left her dream job to make handmade collectible cloth dolls (Muñecas) in honor of her Honduran heritage. Her dolls and other textile work have been featured on the *Oprah Winfrey Show*, *Martha Stewart Living*, catalogues as well as the Jewish Fund Gallery, Ernest Rubenstein Galleries, and the Lincoln Center Education Art Gallery. Her talent also translates to books. She is the author/illustrator of *Me & Mama*, which won a 2021 Coretta Scott King Honor and a Caldecott Honor and *My Hair is a Garden*. She has also collaborated with authors such as Suzanne Slade (*Exquisite: The Poetry and Life of Gwendolyn Brooks*), Leslé Honoreé (*Brown Girl, Brown Girl*), Patricia McKissack (*Stitchin’ and Pullin’ A Gees Bend Quilt*), and Nikki Grimes (*Thanks A Million*).



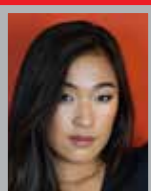
Dare Coulter

You can't spell heart without art, and Dare Coulter has worked to create a career that focuses on heartfelt presentations of the human experience, life, joy, and resilience. She is an award-winning professional sculptor, artist, muralist, and illustrator. She has illustrated ten children's books, including Kwame Alexander's *An American Story* which earned the 2024 Coretta Scott King Illustrator Book Award, as well as her adaptation of the nursery rhyme *You Are My Sunshine*. Dare creates imagery that reflects the fullness and vibrancy of the black cultural experience in all of her books and artwork. Some of her most notable work includes a commissioned painting of Nina Simone for the National Trust for Historic Preservation, a 200-foot mural in Greensboro honoring oft-unmentioned black cowboys, and a monument to black joy and resilience on the University of North Carolina campus at Wilmington. Her dream is to create monumental sculptures for black joy and share her passion for art all over the world.



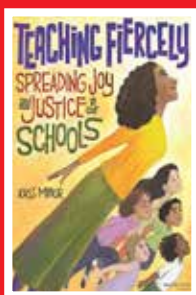
Candace Fleming

Candace Fleming awarded herself the Newbery Medal in fifth grade after scraping the gold sticker off the class copy of *The Witch of Blackbird Pond* and pasting it onto her first novel—a ten-page, ten-chapter mystery called *Who Done It?* She's been collecting her own awards ever since. Today, Candace is the versatile and acclaimed author of more than forty award-winning books, including biographies, picture books, middle-grade novels, nonfiction, and teen novels for young readers. She has tackled historical nonfiction using a narrative voice that employs a blend of humor and research to tell stories such as *The Family Romanov: Murder, Rebellion, and the Fall of the Russian Empire*; *The Enigma Girls: How Ten Teenagers Broke Ciphers, Kept Secrets, and Helped Win World War II*, and her upcoming *Death in the Jungle: Murder, Betrayal, and the Lost Dream of Jonestown*. Her picture books bring information and joy to younger readers, such as the Sibert Award winners *Giant Squid* and *Honeybee: The Busy Life of APIs Mellifera*.



Liz Kleinrock

Liz Kleinrock (she/her) understands the intersectionality of identity more than most. She is a Korean-American transracial adoptee, queer, Jewish, antibias, and antiracist educator of both children and adults. Her journey to embrace her complex identity and find spaces for belonging has shaped her transformative work in helping educators create anti-bias curricula featuring inquiry-based units of study for K-12 students. She practices what she preaches as she has taught across the country in various grades. In 2018, Liz received the Teaching Tolerance Award for Excellence in Teaching, and in 2019, she delivered her TED Talk, "How to Teach Kids to Talk about Taboo Topics." In the spring of 2021, Liz released her bestselling book for educators, *Start Here, Start Now: A Guide to Antibias and Antiracist Work in Your School Community*. Her work is about reaching kids, so she doesn't limit herself to writing to educators. She has also co-written picture books representing her history and identity, including *Eyes That Weave the World's Wonders* and *What Jewish Looks Like*.



Kass Minor

Kass Minor believes in the power of teachers to create a community for learning and justice. She is an inclusive educator and community organizer deeply involved in local, inquiry-based teacher research and school community development. She is the author of *Teaching Fiercely: Spreading Joy and Justice in Our Schools*. While she has worked in partnership with the University of Chicago, Teachers College, The Author Village, and the New York City Department of Education, the classroom teacher is her most coveted role. Kass reads books like other people listen to albums; the classroom is her concert space. While Kass's organizing work in school communities is inspired by her NorthStars Myles Horton and Fannie Lou Hamer, her pedagogy is centered on joy from the communities that surround her and motivated by the idea that every adult can teach and every student can learn. Teacherhood, paired with motherhood, has driven her love of information sharing and redefining who gets to be a knower in the fiery world we live in today.

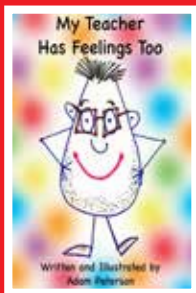

Ernest Morrell

It would be impossible to capture all of Ernest Morrell's accomplishments in a short biography. Since 2015, he has been annually ranked among the top university-based education scholars and has been recognized by many organizations for his work. His dedication to critical pedagogy and literacy is evident as the Associate Dean of Humanities and Equity in the College of Arts and Letters, a Coyle Professor in English and Africana Studies, and Director of the Center for Literacy Education at Notre Dame. He is also the Director of NCTE's Squire Office for Policy Research, an elected National Academy of Education member, and an American Educational Research Association fellow. He has authored or co-authored nearly 120 articles, chapters, and books, including *Tuned in Teaching: Centering Youth Culture for an Active and Just Classroom* and *Tell Your Story: Teaching Students to Become World-Changing Thinkers and Writers*. He has partnered with multiple publishers to develop inclusive curricula, such as Savvas' My Perspectives and My View.



Adam Peterson

Adam Peterson embraces the best of humanity by reminding us to find the people who make our days brighter and "be the yellow" for others. He is an award-winning educator from Illinois and an internationally recognized speaker. After spending more than a decade as a kindergarten teacher, Adam uses his knowledge and talents to inspire, educate, and motivate other teachers to create classrooms that encourage creativity, play, and engagement. Adam is a best-selling author who has written several children's books, such as *Yellow* and *My Teacher Has Feelings Too*. He also spreads his message of kindness and joy to teachers with his two professional books – *Teach, Play, Learn!* and *The Science Box*. Adam is also a TEDx speaker, and his message of making the world a brighter place through his *Be The Yellow* talk and campaign has reached schools around the globe with videos and assemblies for kids. He has a must-listen podcast, "*On My Way to School*," designed to inspire and motivate teachers across all grades and content.



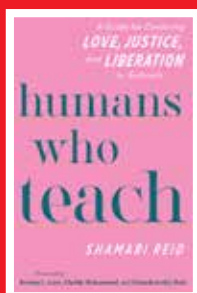
Darius Phelps

Darius Phelps is a writer who writes because he chooses to. Ask him to drop a few lines, and your heart will intertwine with his as he lays out his truth. He has been known to share his poetry at venues ranging from city hotspots to stuffy hotel conference rooms. A PhD Candidate at Teachers College, Columbia University, he is the Assistant Director of Programs under The Center for Publishing & Applied Liberal Arts (PALA) department at NYU. An educator, poet, spoken word artist, and activist, Darius writes poems about grief, liberation, emancipation, and reflection through the lens of a teacher of color and experiencing Black boy joy. His poems have appeared in the *NY English Record*, *NCTE English Journal*, *Pearl Press Magazine*, *ëN Magazine*, and many more. He shares how to create liberating spaces for students by demonstrating how teachers can use their stories to reflect, strengthen their literacy instruction, and cultivate a space of bravery, healing, and love in their classrooms.



Dwayne Reed

Dwayne Reed is the teacher you always wished you had! He is America's Favorite Rapping Teacher and the Chief Enthusiasm Officer (CEO) of **TeachMrReed**, the global education company inspiring the world to make learning fun again. After becoming a viral sensation with his YouTube series, **Mr. Reed Reads**, and appearances on *Good Morning America*, *World News Tonight*, *BBC News*, and *The Jimmy Kimmel Live Show*, he added writer to his repertoire with his children's books, *Simon B Rhyming* series and *All Good in the Hood*. In the not too distant future, his new book for teachers will be released, and it is guaranteed to equip teachers to embrace joy, justice, and humanity in their classrooms. As an avid philanthropist, Mr. Reed has partnered with iconic brands that include 3M, Old Navy, Arby's, and Abbott Laboratories to celebrate educators and raise awareness of youth issues. Mr. Reed also supports countless youth charities, after-school programs, and educational nonprofits dedicated to student-centered learning and academic achievement.



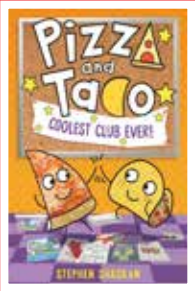
Shamari Reid

Shamari Reid (he/him/his) wants everyone to know they are special and worthy just as they are. He has spent his career centering love. He is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Teaching and Learning at NYU. As a scholar, Shamari's work explores how Black trans and queer youth and their communities sustain themselves amidst oppression, as well as how we can collaborate with these communities to better transform schools into sites of equitable opportunities for Black LGBTQ+ youth. His dissertation was awarded the 2022 Dissertation of the Year Award by the Queer Studies SIG of AERA. In addition, his work examines radical love as a moral imperative toward creating culturally sustaining school communities for all students and the teachers who guide them. In his latest book, ***Humans Who Teach: A Guide to Centering Love, Justice, and Liberation in Schools***, he shares his heart to remind educators they are "first and foremost human," and it is within that humanity they can nurture all students.



Dan Santat

Dan Santat wore an old Wimbledon t-shirt under his tux for luck at the National Book Awards, and it must have paid off – even though he didn’t need it. He is the well-deserved 2023 National Book Award for Young People’s Literature winner for his heartwarming middle-grade graphic novel, *A First Time For Everything*. He is also the Caldecott Medal-winning creator of *The Adventures of Beekle: The Unimaginary Friend*, the #1 *New York Times*-bestselling *Are We There Yet?*, and the *New York Times*-bestselling book *After the Fall (How Humpty Dumpty Got Back Up Again)* as well as over a hundred other young people’s books. He has collaborated with numerous children’s book authors and illustrators, including Dav Pilkey (*Ricky Ricotta’s Mighty Robot* series), Samantha Berger (*Crankenstein*), Minh Le (*Drawn Together*, *Lift*, *The Blur*, *Built to Last*), Lisa Yee (*The Misfits* series), and Laurel Snyder (*Endlessly Ever After*). As if that does not keep him busy enough, he is the creator of *The Replacements* animated television series.



Stephen Shaskan

Stephen Shaskan has always loved comics – reading them and making them! He grew up reading *Marvel*, *DC*, *Harvey Comics*, and *Mad Magazine* and created his first comic, *Super Grandpa*, in elementary school. He is also a talented musician who plays the guitar, keyboard, and bass and has performed in multiple bands. He is the author and illustrator of several picture books, including *Big Choo*, *Toad on the Road*, *Max Speed*, *The Three Triceratops Tuff*, and *A Dog Is a Dog*, which was featured in the New York Public Library’s “Best Picture Books of the Year” list. His graphic novel series *Pizza and Taco* is a massive hit, and two more installments will be released soon. He has found a great partner in his wife, whom he met at an elementary school where he was teaching art and she was teaching writing. Together, they have collaborated on several books, including *Punk Skunks* and the graphic novel series *Q and Ray*.



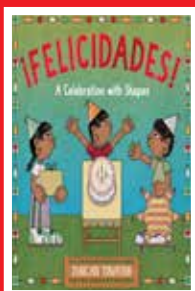
Trisha Speed Shaskan

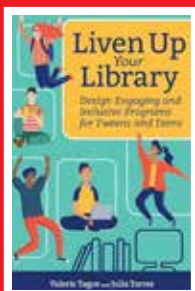
Amy Stewart

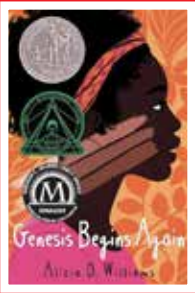
Duncan Tonatiuh

Sibert Medal, the Tomás Rivera Mexican American Children's Book Award, the Américas Award, the Jane Addams Children's Book Award, and multiple Texas Bluebonnet Award Master List selections and *New York Times* Best Illustrated Books mentions. His critically acclaimed works include *Diego Rivera: His World and Ours*, *Pancho Rabbit and the Coyote*, *Separate Is Never Equal*, *Funny Bones*, *Soldier For Equality*, *Child of the Flower-Song People*, his latest book, *Game of Freedom*, and many others.



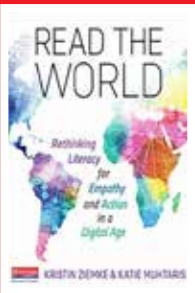
Julia E. Torres

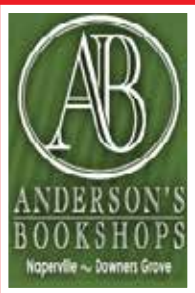
Alicia D. Williams

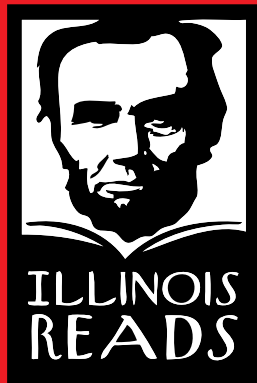
Kristin Ziemke

She is committed to the community and partners with local school districts to raise funds for books. Becky won a Hall of Fame Award from the Illinois Reading Council, among many other honors. In 2011, Anderson's BookShops was named *Publisher's Weekly* Bookstore of the Year—one of the highest accolades a book retailer can receive, and she personally delivered books to the White House Library, where she met President Obama. Her work carries on today as Becky continues advocating for independent bookstores, and Anderson's remains a force in the bookstore world, providing everyone with a heartfelt home for joyous reading.

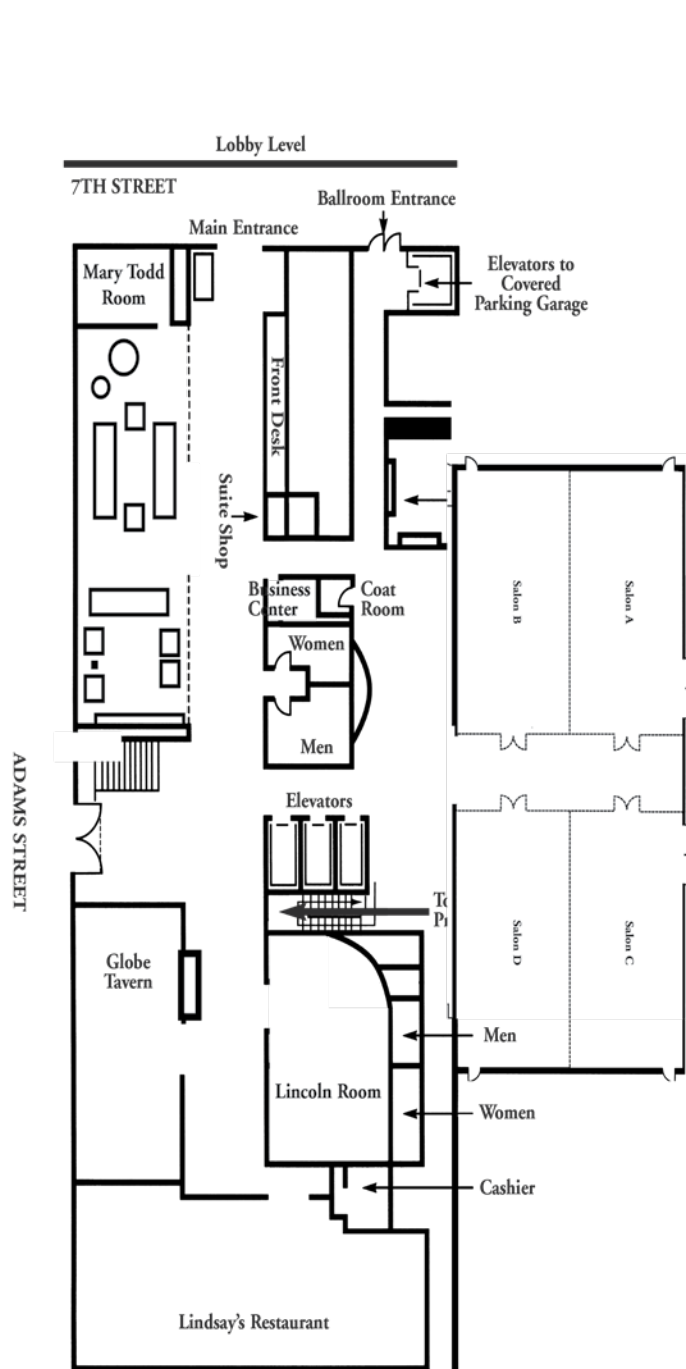
