UNLOCKING THE ILLINOIS COMPREHENSIVE LITERACY PLAN: ORACY

In this article, you will find part 2 of a series from Will County Reading Council on implementing the ICLP: Note that Core Instructional Practices identified in the plan for literacy components are neither exhaustive nor inclusive across all grade levels and for all learners.

Oracy is included in all grade levels and is



more than oral reading fluency. It is engagement in communication through a wide range of literacy experiences that supports students' critical thinking and communication of their ideas, thoughts, and comprehension. The ICLP reminds us (p.34) that Oracy ranges from engaging in oral language for social interaction in early childhood, through navigating complex and diverse communication situations in high school. Here is a taste of the ICLP's examples of evidence-based practices.

• Early childhood and the primary grades: Use storytelling and interactive read-alouds,


rather than passively reading aloud to children. Encourage children to talk about and use new vocabulary, instead of merely memorizing new words for a test.

- Intermediate grades: engage students in talking about their ideas before writing, as well
 as thinking aloud and discussing ideas before, during, and after reading. Students receive
 teacher and peer feedback on their speaking as well as the content of their writing before
 presenting orally.
- Middle school: Students research a topic of interest and present as experts, developing their Oracy skills through spontaneous Q & A and debate instead of reading a "report."
- High school: Teachers utilize Oracy practices by engaging students in current events or content discussions, first teaching students how to read and listen and then how to respond to peers as they consider multiple perspectives on a topic, rather than scripted speeches.

Family Literacy Bookshelf By Barb Ashton


Although August has no major holidays to celebrate, it is Family Fun Month and National Picnic Month. Tthere is still time to enjoy your local summer fest or your local county fair, and the Illinois State Fair. So grab your favorite summer beverage, relax, and enjoy the remaining days of summer.



Every August, we are reminded about The March on Washington and Martin Luther King's famous *I Have a Dream* speech and the effect this event had on the Civil Rights Movement and America. To understand how this event came about, read *Unstoppable: How Bayard Rustin Organized* the 1963 March on Washington by Michael G. Long. This is the biography of Bayard Rustin, a civil rights activist who planned and organized this event for jobs and freedom. Prior to this event, Bayard organized protests against war, nuclear weapons, racial segregation, and discrimination with nonviolent action. Bayard was also a friend and mentor to Martin Luther King. Although Bayard faced opposition and failure, he wouldn't be stopped and the event became the largest protest in the history of the Civil Rights Movement.


Unstoppable is an informative and engaging read and serves as a nice introduction to the Civil Rights Movement but also lets the reader know about a lesser known figure who played an important part in the success of The March on Washington. The beautiful illustrations capture the emotions felt by the main character. While this book is geared to younger readers, it can also be

used with all grade levels. The back of the book provides additional information for further reading on this time period and event.



Through news and media coverage, along with executive orders, we frequently hear the words immigration, deportation, and citizenship. Just what do these words mean? To help our students understand these words, read the new book <u>Some of Us: A Story of Citizenship and the United States</u> by Rajani LaRocca. So what does citizenship mean and look like? As the author states: "Some of us are citizens by birth. Some of us are born beyond the United States and gain citizenship through immigration and naturalization." This is a story told in lyrical prose of the many paths people have taken to become citizens of the United States. Over the years

these people who live among us have contributed much to our communities and America through their work, knowledge, and skills, etc. They also share their cultural heritage as well. They contribute and participate in our democracy/government at all levels. Through the use of mixed media artwork, the illustrations depict families of various cultures that enhance the message of the book. **Some of Us** is a book that is timely and the back of the book contains an author's note about citizenship along with resources and bibliography for additional reading.



Do you like to solve mysteries or puzzles? If so, then grab your pencil and solve the puzzles/mysteries in the new book <u>MURDLE JR.: Curious Crimes For Curious Minds</u> by G. T. Karber. Join Junior Detectives, Jake, Olivia, Julius, and Buster McPaws, as they present various puzzles and mysteries that need your assistance to solve each case and figure out Who Dunit. Each case starts with a short narrative followed by several clues and logic puzzles that lead to solving the case. <u>MURDLE JR.: Curious Crimes for Curious Minds</u> is kid friendly and age appropriate for late primary students and up. So get on board the <u>MURDLE</u> craze with humorous illustrations, clues, logic puzzles, and hours of fun while discovering the culprit and solving the mystery. Upon completion of the book you can become a Junior Detective and receive a membership card in the Detective Club. There is also an adult version of <u>MURDLE BOOKS</u>.


#WhatIAmReading: Share a book that you are reading, in 3 to 4 sentences. Creative pictures of you and your book in your favorite reading spot are encouraged.
