Sunshine: A Graphic Novel by Jarrett J. Krosoczka is a memoir of when the author was a senior in high school and spent his summer working at Camp Sunshine – a camp for kids with life-threatening illnesses and their families. Along with five classmates, not knowing what to expect, Jarrett uses his art and various camp activities to help these kids to "be kids" and have fun in spite of their illnesses. Jarrett had a rewarding experience of volunteering, learning about the hope, determination, and life changing experiences of these amazing kids and their families, along with the difference he made in their lives.



Cloaked in Courage: Uncovering Deborah Sampson, Patriot Soldier by Beth Anderson is the story of 18-year-old Deborah Sampson who joins the Continental Army (disguised as Robert Shurtliff) to fight for America's independence. Facing several challenges, she learns life as a soldier is hard work and can be dangerous. During a battle Deborah is wounded but runs away for fear of being discovered. As a result of her wound Deborah becomes ill and is taken to the hospital. Will her identity be discovered and will she be honorably discharged? Read Cloaked in Courage to find the answer and learn more about this historical figure.



Fast Pitch by Nic Stone is the story of Shenice, who's captain of her all black softball team – the Firebirds. As a winning team and headed towards the championship, the team faces discrimination and racism but they forge on and continue to win. At the same time Shenice learns abot her great-grandfather who was framed for a crime he didn't commit and was denied joining the Major Leagues. Determined to solve the mystery about her great-grandfather, dealing with the pressure to win the championship, can Shenice lead her team to victory? Read Fast Pitch to learn the outcome of this engaging novel that will appeal to middle school readers and baseball fans.

Illinois Literacy Plan

The Illinois State Board of Education released its first draft of the Illinois Literacy Plan, as required by Senate Bill 2243, which is still awaiting the signature of Governor Pritzker. The plan can be found on the ISBE Website at: Illinois Literacy Plan.

ISBE would like to gather feedback on the Plan. A listening tour is being conducted across the state, to include the following dates and locations:

- July 31, 2023 from 12:00 to 3:00 pm: Virtual Zoom Meeting, Meeting ID: 824 3607 1583, Passcode: 421877

According to a press release from ISBE, "The plan explains the fundamental components of literacy, addresses the need for comprehensive and coordinated professional development for both current and aspiring teachers, and recommends detailed next steps to ensure all students receive equitable and effective literacy instruction. The plan gives special consideration to

English learners, whose unique needs and skills pose both challenges and opportunities for English literacy development."

ISBE will incorporate the feedback gathered during the listening tour into a second draft of the Illinois Literacy Plan. A second listening tour will be conducted in the fall. ISBE aims to finalize the literacy plan in early 2024.
