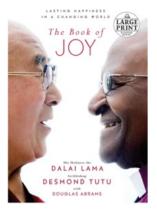

THREE BOOKS TO SUPPORT TEENS AND THEIR SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL NEEDS By Matt Renwick

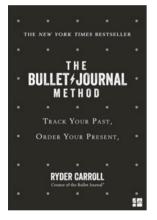
Adolescents continue to struggle with anxiety and other mental health challenges. Pressure from school, social media, and just being a teenager are common obstacles.

Teens can benefit from practical tools offered in self-help literature to address social and emotional needs. It's not a genre commonly covered in schools, yet now seems an opportune time to introduce it. The following three books offer wisdom and strategies that can empower students to improve their wellbeing.



<u>The Book of Joy: Lasting Happiness in a Changing</u> <u>World</u> by His Holiness the Dalai Lama, Archbishop Desmond Tutu, and Douglas Carlton Abrams

Although this dialogue between two spiritual leaders is not a step-bystep guide, *The Book of Joy* provides a practical framework for cultivating joy despite one's obstacles. Both the Dalai Lama and the Archbishop demonstrate how their struggles transformed how they interact with the world for the better.



<u>The Bullet Journal Method: Track the Past, Order</u> <u>the Present, Design the Future</u> by Ryder Carroll

Ryder Carroll struggled with ADHD in school. His saving grace was drawing and doodling in his notebook. Over time, he leveraged his notebooking to develop a system for being more productive and present. I personally use a bullet journal every day to manage my work as a systems coach, writer, parent, and husband.



<u>The Power of Character Strengths: Appreciate and Ignite Your Positive Personality</u> by Ryan M. Niemiec and Robert E. McGrath

This resource helps readers become more aware of their signature strengths and how to leverage them in life. It also minimizes our weaknesses which can combat negativity bias. My wife and two teenage kids took the free companion character assessment and had an insightful conversation as we shared our results with each other.



FIVE DYSTOPIAN NOVELS TO READ THIS SUMMER By Jennifer Erickson

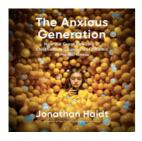

The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood Is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness was written by Jonathan Haidt. The book is an investigation into the collapse of youth mental health in the era of smartphones, social media, and big tech with a plan for a healthier and freer childhood.

<u>Rebellion 1776</u> was written by Laurie Halse Anderson. The book club participants will delve into this novel study on a thoroughly researched and emotionally resonant historical fiction book for middle grades.





La Enseñanza en el Aula Bilingüe: Content, Language, and Biliteracy was written by Sandra Mercuri, Sandra Musanti, and Alma Rodriguez. The book club will help educators who dedicate their work to bilingualism, biliteracy, and equity for bilingual learners as well as strengthen their own academic reading and writing in Spanish. The book is mostly written in Spanish with previews in English.

Register by <u>June 15, 2025</u>, to participate in the book club. Registration is FREE for IRC Members. The cost for non-members is \$50, which

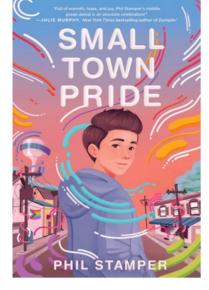

With the school year coming to an end, we welcome June with its sunny and warmer weather. During this month, we will also be celebrating Father's Day, LGBTQ Pride, Alzheimer's Awareness month, and our newest holiday – Juneteenth.

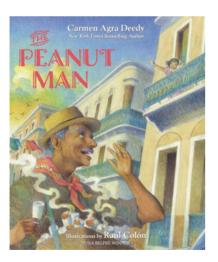
<u>Small Town Pride</u> by Phil Stamper is a poignant coming-of-age, contemporary middle grade debut novel about finding your place, using your voice, and the true meaning of pride. Jake is just starting to enjoy life as his school's first openly gay kid. While his family and friends are accepting and supportive, the same can't be said about everyone in their small town. When Jake's dad hangs a large pride flag in their front yard in a show of love, the mayor begins to receive complaints. A few people



are even concerned the flag will lead to something truly outlandish: a pride parade. Except Jake doesn't think that's a ridiculous idea. Why *can't* they hold a pride festival in Barton Springs, Ohio? As Jake and his friends try to find a way to get approval from the town council and mayor, it seems suspicious that the mayor's son, Brett, suddenly wants to spend time with Jake. But someone that cute couldn't possibly be in league with his mayoral mother, could he?



Free at Last: A Juneteenth Poem by Sojourner Kincaid Rolle is a lyrical celebration of Juneteenth, deeply rooted in Black American history, spanning centuries and reverberating loudly and proudly today. Deeply emotional, evocative free verse by poet and activist Sojourner Kincaid Rolle traces the solemnity and celebration of Juneteenth from its 1865 origins in Galveston, Texas to contemporary observances all over the United States. This is an ode to the strength of Black Americans and a call to remember and honor a holiday whose importance reverberates far beyond the borders of Texas.



The Peanut Man by Carmen Agra Deedy is the story of a Cuban refugee and her joy in an unexpected encounter that connects her beloved home in Havana with her new home in Atlanta. Each evening, Coqui waits for Emilio, the Peanut Man, watching for him to appear on the street below her window. They always greet each other in their own special way. Night after night, the two friends continue their ritual until one evening, she tells him that her family is moving to the United States. After several years have passed and she has forgotten her beloved Peanut Man, her father surprises her with two tickets for a Braves game to see their favorite player, Hammerin' Hank Aaron. At the game, Coqui hears a man yelling "Peanuts! Get your peanuts!" The delicious smell of roasted peanuts reaches her and memories of home and Emilio rush into her head.
