It is an especially important book right now because we are so inundated with the sheer badness of people, singularly and collectively, and while I do not like to stick my head in the sand, I also do not want to believe that this is the best we can do as a people. Bregman addresses history, literature, religion, psychology, and geography (and probably a few perspectives I've omitted) to demonstrate that humans are not as intrinsically awful as we are often led to believe. It is a relatively easy read, and definitely a thoughtful one. For someone who finds themselves in a general funk these days, this book will help. For someone who is generally curious about the human race, this book will tip the mental scales in an upward position. Bregman finds the threads of humanity that reflect kindness and uses them to weave a sunnier tapestry than the one currently cloaking the world.

Let's not forget to "Give Thanks" for the many blessings we've received this year on Thanksgiving Day.



Remember by Joy Harjo, written in free verse, invites the reader to stop and reflect on the beautiful world that surrounds them and their place within the world. The poet, the 23rd Poet Laureate of the United States and a member of the native American Mvskoke Nation, encourages the reader to reflect on their family, nature, and their heritage. Within the poem, Harjo further reminds the reader that as inhabitants of the earth we are all interconnected and that each of us has a part to play within this world. The beautiful watercolor illustrations by native American artist Michaela Goade, a member of the Tlingit Culture, enhance the written word and make the message of the poem come alive. *Remember* is a great book to share with

families and would make an excellent addition to your Native American collection.



Killers of the Flower Moon: Adapted for Young Reader Edition: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI by David Grann is the story of the Osage Nation during what is known as the Reign of Terror period within their Native American community. It's the 1920's and oil has been discovered on their reservation in the state of Oklahoma. As a result of this discovery the Osage people became very rich. They built beautiful mansions, bought and drove luxury cars, formed successful businesses, and built schools, with some Osage parents sending their children to Europe to be educated. At the same time members of this Native American community who were targeted for their wealth began to lose their lives. Not knowing who would be next and with the number reaching over 24, the newly formed FBI took over the case to solve the mystery. This case eventually became the FBI's first major homicide investigation, for which they formed an undercover team that included the only Native American agent within the FBI.

While struggling to use early known forensic and investigative techniques, the agents began to put the pieces of the puzzle together. With the assistance of many Osage people the agents began to expose one of the most shocking crimes in American history. *Killers of the Flower Moon* is a true story of how greedy and prejudiced white men treated Native Americans and how the cases were eventually solved and brought to court. This is a very well written and informative book that provides many opportunities for discussion on injustice, prejudice, greed etc. The back of the book provides a wealth of information associated with the story. You can also hear David Grann explain how he wrote the book on YouTube.



On November 22, America will commemorate the 60th anniversary of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. To understand this horrific event read **The President Has Been Shot: The Assassination of John F. Kennedy** by James L. Swanson. This book is adapted for young readers to introduce John Kennedy, the son of a wealthy political New England family, war hero, family man, and U.S. Senator. The author tells Kennedy's story by giving a quick overview of Kennedy's early political life, election as president, and his first years in office that were marked by the Cuban Missile Crisis and the Space Race. The author then takes the reader to Lee Harvey Oswald, an impoverished, temperamental, attention-seeking individual, and his life in the days before and after the assassination. While on a political trip to Texas, riding in an open car motorcade, enjoying the cheering crowds, Kennedy is shot and killed. The pursuit, arrest, assassination of Oswald, the somber funeral of

Kennedy, and FBI investigation add further details to this horrific event that changed America. The use of charts, diagrams, maps, and numerous period photographs engages and shows the reader the real places that these events occurred. The back of the book includes source notes, a bibliography, and places to visit in Dallas, Texas. *The President Has Been Shot* is an interesting and fascinating book for students to read and would make a great resource for all libraries.
