UNLOCKING THE ILLINOIS COMPREHENSIVE LITERACY PLAN: PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS

Our series continues with part 3 on implementing the <u>ICLP</u>: As previously noted, Core Instructional Practices in the Literacy Plan are neither exhaustive nor inclusive across all grade levels and for all learners.

Phonological Awareness (PA) includes hearing and manipulating spoken sounds, syllables, onset-rimes, and phonemes, and is considered a crucial foundational skill for developing readers. Remember, Phonics is the application of sounds to print, and is addressed later.

Systemic and explicit instruction is key in developing readers, writers, and spellers. Although often considered an early elementary skill focus, understanding the role of Phonological Awareness in upper grades continues to support literacy skills. The LCLP reminds us of this (p.38) and offers ideas to consider for students in Pre-k through high school. Here are some examples of the ICLP's evidence-based practices for Phonological Awareness (PA), as well as what this might look like in the upper grades.

Early Childhood and Primary Grades:

- The playfulness of songs, rhyming, poetry, and movement provides personalized learning rather than relying on worksheets or assuming they have developed PA.
- When teaching students how to isolate and identify sounds, use manipulatives to help them learn how to spell, rather than focusing solely on spelling without a sound-based approach

Middle School:

 Teach students how to apply phonemic skills to multi-syllable words they are learning to spell, rather than giving them a list of spelling words to memorize. Continue to remind students how to approach content-specific words using phonemic awareness skills and introduce the role of dialects in language.

High School:

 Help students consider and use phonological tools as they read and write across the curriculum instead of telling them how to pronounce complex words. Expanding students' understanding of dialects and language also promotes deeper literacy outcomes.



Beginning October 19, participants will be reading, reflecting on, and responding in the *The Anxious Generation* book club, the *Rebellion 1776* book club, and/or the *La Enseñanza en el Aula Bilingüe* book club during the seven-weeks of online discussions.

The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood Is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness was written by Jonathan Haidt. The book is an investigation into the collapse of youth mental health in the era of smartphones, social media, and big tech with a plan for a healthier and freer childhood.





<u>Rebellion 1776</u> was written by Laurie Halse Anderson. The book club participants will delve into this novel study on a thoroughly researched and emotionally resonant historical fiction book for middle grades.

Register by <u>October 15, 2025</u>, to participate in the book club.





Family Literacy Bookshelf By Barb Ashton



A Plate of Hope: The Inspiring Story of Chef José Andrés and World Central Kitchen is written by Erin Frankel and illustrated by Paola Escobar. It is a timely book especially considering what is going on in Gaza, Ukraine, and other parts of the world. It tells the story of how José Andrés started the World Central Kitchen. The Author's Note in the back of the book provides additional information about José Andrés. There is also a bibliography with websites that contains further information. This is a book that can be used at all grade levels.





Home is Calling: The Journey of the Monarch Butterfly is written by Katherine Pryor and illustrated by Ellie Peterson. This is a beautifully illustrated book that tells/explains how the Monarch Butterflies from southern Canada and eastern, northern and central United States migrate every autumn/fall to their home in Mexico for the winter. The back of the book contains additional information on this annual journey.



The Superteacher Project is written by Gordon Korman. It is an enjoyable book to share with your middle grade students. This is a story of a new teacher and some interesting students who are assigned to his class. Mr. Korman also includes a "Student Teacher" as one of the characters. The story is told with humor, empathy, and explores the use of AI in education. There is also an interesting twist to the story as well. Will the new teacher become a popular teacher at the school?
